reminder to renew your membership in ASA and in the EMCA section. As of **May (2008)** our section had **170 members**, which is below the 300 members technically required for sections to be maintained. Fortunately, ASA is very flexible about the enforcement of this policy and takes into account factors such as the level of activity for sections when determining whether they can be continued. Nevertheless, we would like to increase membership, not only because of ASA procedures but because we want the section to be a resource for those interested in maintaining and increasing scholarship in EMCA.

In addition, there are two issues that we consider to be important for the future of EMCA. The first is facilitating the career development and integration into the section for graduate student members, the next generation of EMCA scholars. Because EMCA is a relatively small specialty area, many graduate students are at institutions where they do not have access to a wide range of scholars who practice in our field. We are exploring ways that the section can facilitate these types of connections. This process has already begun with a survey of graduate students that Ingrid Li has sent out. As we get the results of this survey, we will be working toward some concrete steps we can take to further integrate graduate students into EMCA research and the life of the section.

Second, although the ASA is primarily a U.S. organization, EMCA is plainly now a world-wide movement. We want to increase connections and communication between U.S. scholars and those working in countries around the world. We

will be exploring various ideas for accomplishing this, including seeking out volunteers willing to be international liaisons for EMCA research in specific countries or regions around the world.



### Profile of Ingrid Li: Incoming *managing editor* for the EMCA section newsletter:

Jack and I would like to introduce incoming editor of the EMCA section Newsletter Ingrid Li.



Ingrid is a Ph.D. student in the Department of Sociology at UC Santa Barbara. Ingrid has a long-standing interest in conversation analysis and has presented papers at the NCA and PSA, among others. Her research has explored such topics as agreements and disagreements, “entitlements,” and the use of success markers. Ingrid’s paper, “Exercising Entitlement in Next Turn: The use of ‘exactly’ as a success-marker,” earned an honorable mention in the Outstanding Graduate Student paper competition for our section in 2008. Ingrid first became interested in conversation analysis while an undergrad at UCLA. After taking a course team-taught by Steven Clayman and John Heritage, Ingrid – in her words – “became hooked!” She writes that conversation analysis “made me think in ways I never thought to – and made me look at my life, and life around me, with a completely new and different perspective.” These experiences led her to consider graduate study in conversation analysis, after a brief stint in the corporate world. At UC Santa Barbara, Ingrid is working with Don Zimmerman, Gene Lerner, and Geoff Raymond. And in addition to conversation analysis, she has research interests in child development, law and society, and politics and mass communication.



### Social Psychology Quarterly – Special Issue

#### The Moral: Social Psychological Perspectives on Morality

The terms "moral" and "social" were interchangeable for 18th and 19th century social theorists. In the past few decades sociologists have become, as Craig Calhoun describes it, "unmusical" in addressing the moral dimension of human life. Morality involves more than the established social psychological fields of altruism and aggression; it encompasses individual and cultural duties, ideals, and prohibitions that shape interaction. A social science of morality looks at the influences on, embodied enactment, and consequences of implicit and explicitly moral orientations toward the good, just, and worthy (and alternately the profane, disgusting, and shameful).

Psychologists and neurologists are currently directing the scientific study of moral behavior, thought, and feeling. With some notable exceptions, such scholars are looking deeper *into* the evolutionarily adapted brain. A sociological counterpart is called for to address morality within the self, social situations, and the life course. Such work encompasses the study of affect, exchange, justice, or values, but may lead to a new syntheses or research programs.

Our goal is to publish a special issue or section of *Social Psychology Quarterly* on the topic of "The Moral: Social Psychological Perspectives on Morality." We welcome submissions from a broad range of empirical and theoretical perspectives, demonstrating the utility (or potential hazards) of sociological understanding on morality. The deadline for submitting papers is **January 1, 2009**. The usual ASA requirements for submissions apply (see "Notice for Contributors"). Please send of copy of your paper as a Word attachment to [spq@northwestern.edu](mailto:spq@northwestern.edu), the submission fee (payable by credit card or check, and waived for graduate student authors), and an indication that the paper is intended for the special issue.
