A UNIQUE COLLABORATION BETWEEN EM/CA SPECIALISTS

and the interdisciplinary Institute of Logic and Cognition at Sun Yat-sen University in China took place from February through April of 2012, for the purpose of introducing ethnomethodology and conversation analysis to Chinese research scholars, postdoctoral fellows, and graduate students who intend to undertake studies of the practices of argumentation and reasoning among Western China's indigenous minority groups. The Institute's Director, Prof. Ju Shier, invited Professors Kenneth Liberman (University of Oregon), Douglas Maynard (University of Wisconsin), and Jack Bilmes (University of Hawaii) to teach them (respectively) ethnomethodology, conversation analysis, and ethnographic conversation analysis. ... continued on page 3 (see "collaboration")



The program began at the start of Sun Yat-sen University's (SYSU) spring semester, following the Chinese New Year's holiday period, in order to commence with an intensive two week Colloquium of four hours daily, in two daily seminars that covered ethnomethodology and conversation analysis. During the first week, Ken Liberman led an introduction to ethnomethodology from 10 am - noon, and Doug Maynard led an introduction to conversation analysis from 3-5 pm in the afternoons. During the second week, Jack Bilmes led the two-hour afternoon seminar on ethnography and conversation analysis, while Liberman continued with morning seminars on produced accounts and reflexivity. Following this two-week Colloquium, Liberman continued with four more weeks of twice-weekly Seminars on ethnomethodology and weekend video labs on ethnomethodological analysis.

The idea for the collaboration came from Dr. Ju Shier (nb. in China, family names are written first), who appreciated what ethnomethodology could contribute methodologically to his Institute's ethnographic survey of indigenous Chinese practices of reasoning, after he read a Chinese translation of Liberman's 2004 book, Dialectical Practices in Tibetan Philosophical Culture. Ju's email from China arrived in Liberman's email inbox one morning in 2009; however, Liberman didn't open it, knowing no one in China (and not even knowing his book had been translated) and thinking it could be spam. A few hours later, Liberman considered the fact that he had never actually received any spam from China, so he... CONTINUED on page 11 (see "China")

CHINA ... continued from page 3 went back and opened it to read Professor Ju's invitation to spend two months teaching in Guangzhou. Guangzhou is a city of 13 million in the southern province of Guangdong (which to British ears became "Canton").

The notion of spending two months giving lectures before assessing how productive the communication might be, gave Liberman pause, so a shorter, two-week period was arranged for the end of 2010, and included a short visit to a field site in southwestern China. The students proved to be fluent readers of ... English, but their oral skills were less than those of American students; however, their capacity to focus their attention exceeded that of many American students, resulting in an equivalent learning competence.

When Liberman returned to the US, he reported to Harold Garfinkel the details of the visit (five months before Garfinkel passed way). Very pleased ("You're full of good news!"), Garfinkel urged further collaboration. Having learned that it was indeed possible to communicate ethnomethodology to Chinese scholars at SYSU, Liberman accepted an invitation to return for a two-month period. He also invited Prof. Ju, who is a philosopher with specialization in ancient Chinese logic, to attend the IIEMCA international conference in Lausanne in the summer of 2011, which Ju did, attending with one of his students, Xiaojing. At the conference Ju, whose son is a graduate student in sociology in Hong Kong, discovered conversation analysis and was impressed enough to ask Liberman to find a scholar who could teach CA.

Doug Maynard kindly considered the invitation but speculated, as Liberman had, about the likelihood of adequate communication. After hearing of Ken's experience that the Institute of Logic and Cognition had excellent, serious young scholars, Doug accepted the challenge, and he was as impressed with the Chinese students as Liberman was. Maynard reports, "It was really an incredible experience, and what a compliment it is to EM and CA that the Institute could recognize its potential for analyzing indigenous and endogenous structures in local social situations, and could assist them in addressing their larger concerns."

Ju Shier met Jack Bilmes at the IIEMCA conference and invited him to teach conversation analysis from an ethnographer's perspective. Bilmes also provided some conversation analysis data workshops, giving the students hands-on experience analyzing some of their own data, and he emphasized the need to undertake their CA analytic work with the Pinyin orthography for Mandarin characters. Jack invited Ms. Wang Lu, an SYSU doctoral candidate in anthropology who has been filming Western and traditional clinical medical settings in China, to the University of Hawaii for additional studies.

The graduate students and postdoctoral scholars in attendance came from the fields of anthropology, linguistics, formal logic, philosophy of language, cognitive psychology, clinical psychology, sociology, folklore, computer science, and the history of mathematics, making for an extraordinary interdisciplinary collaboration. The fifteen students divided themselves into three research groups for the purpose of short projects that could ... c o n t i n u e d o n page 12 (see "STUDENTS")

"STUDENTS" – continued from page 11 be made the basis for teaching them EM and CA analytic methods. Their projects included second language classrooms (a Chinese teaching foreigners Chinese and a Canadian teaching English to Chinese students), traditional Chinese tea-tasting sessions, and pedestrian/bicycle/automobile traffic flow in Guangzhou. Students were taught the differences among EM analysis, CA analysis, and ethnography, without any of the three being prioritized. They learned to use ELAN and Final Cut Pro to undertake their analytic work.

The principal objective was to teach the Chinese scholars techniques they will be able to use in their anticipated research survey of the practices of reasoning in Western China (including Tibet). They hope that their research can provide a basis for improving communication and cooperation among the peoples of China. Will this intensive program of colloquia and seminars prove sufficient to permit EM and CA research to establish itself in China? How will this interest sustain itself? This will very much depend upon the research that the Institute undertakes; however, all three visiting professors have offered their continuing interest and involvement, and there is surely scope for other EM/CA scholars to collaborate (any Chinese speakers would be especially welcome). Maynard and Liberman have volunteered to return to Guangzhou after the Institute has collected some field data, made transcripts, and commenced their analyses. The success of their efforts, ethnomethodologically speaking, will depend – as always – upon whether the Chinese scholars are able to find perspicuous settings (and recordings) that exhibit well the local interactional phenomena that identify the practices of reasoning that they are seeking to describe.
