KITANO NAMED TO ENDOWED CHAIR

Harry H. L. Kitano, University of California, Los Angeles professor of Social Welfare and Sociology and acting director of the Asian American Studies Center, has been selected to hold an endowed chair in Japanese American Studies. An internationally known scholar in the field of race relations, Kitano was named to the UCLA Alumni and Friends of Japanese Ancestry

Chair in Japanese American Studies after a lengthy, nationwide search. Several hundred individuals and foundations contributed to the establishment of the chair; contributions included a \$50,000 matching grant from the Japan-United States Friendship Commission. Harry Kitano is the first to occupy the chair, which was established several years ago. Congratulations!

AMERASIA JOURNAL

UCLA's Asian American Studies Center announces the publication of a special issue of AMERASIA JOURNAL on Asians in Canada and the Caribbean. Edited by Shirley Hune of Hunter College and Russell Leong of UCLA, the journal includes articles by Christine Ho on the Chinese in Guyana, Trinidad, and Jamaica; Evelyn Hu-Dehart on the Chinese in Mexico and Peru; and Jack Masson on the Indian community in Canada.

Southeast Asian immigrants to Canada and the U.S. are covered by three articles: Yen Le Espiritu on the Chinese Vietnamese in America; David Haines on Asian resettlement policies in Canada and the United States; and Cindy Wong on the Chinese Vietnamese Buddhist community.

Articles on the Korean community are presented by Pyong Gap Min and by Edna Bonacich. Edward Pai introduces the readers to Kim San's historical saga.

The journal concludes with a 70-page bibliography on Asian Americans compiled by Glenn Omatsu.

Only a limited number of the journal is being published for non-subscribers. Individual copies are \$7.00 per issue plus applicable tax and \$1 handling
