

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Headquarters for the Annual Meeting is located in the Denver Hilton Hotel, but many activities will be held at the Brown Palace Hotel two blocks away. In designating locations of activities, only room names are listed for the Denver Hilton; those located in the Brown Palace give the hotel name and the room.

SERVICES

The following services are located in the Convention Lobby of the Denver Hilton:

1. Registration. Pre-registrants may pick up their kits and badges; others may register, pay their fees, and receive their kits. The registration booths are staffed by employees of the Denver Convention Bureau who are not knowledgeable about other aspects of the program or the affairs of the ASA. For such information, please go to the ASA desk in the registration area.
2. ASA Desk. An ASA staff member will be able to give you information relating to membership, publications, program, etc.
3. Luncheon Roundtable Information Desk.
4. Hospitality Desk. Although no formal tours have been planned, information will be available on sightseeing, shopping, restaurants, and the many attractions of the Denver area.
5. Message Board. Names of those for whom there are messages will be posted here and you should check the board frequently for your name. The messages will be kept in a file to insure privacy. Because this service is designed primarily for those persons not staying in hotels, we strongly urge you to use the hotels' mail and message desks whenever possible.

Seminar Sessions

Participants in the Seminars will be expected to have read the papers before attending the sessions. Copies of these papers are available in the Savoy Room for a fee of \$1.00. Attendance at each Seminar Session will be limited to 20 persons.

Contributed Paper Sessions

As in the Seminar Sessions, papers will only be summarized in the three Contributed Paper Sessions (68, 82, and 112). These papers are available in the Savoy Room at a cost of \$1.00 each.

Dartmouth Curriculum:

Using the Time-Sharing Computer

On Wednesday at 8:30 a.m., six brief papers will be presented on this topic in Session 92, "Teaching Undergraduate Sociology—Using the Time-Sharing Computer." A discussion period will follow.

On Wednesday afternoon demonstrations of the system will be held in the Book Exhibit Area from 12:00 to 2:00 p.m. There will be a telephone terminal connection with the computer at Dartmouth. An open demonstration from 2:00 to 6:00 p.m. will provide interested persons with an opportunity for questions. Preregistrants for these demonstrations have already received materials from Dartmouth.

Film Demonstration

In addition to Session 19, "Film as a Research and Instructional Tool," there will be a continuous showing of various films which exemplify the technique on Tuesday, August 31, in Ballroom A of the Brown Palace Hotel.
