Major ASA Awards Announced During New York Meetings

Announcements of several major awards were made during the first plenary session of the ASA Annual Meeting on August 30. The 1976 Sorokin Award Committee decided to identify two recipients. The following citation was presented by Barbara Laslett as Chair of the 1976 Sorokin Award Selection Committee:

"It is my pleasure to present the 1976 Sorokin Award jointly to two works of sociology which acknowledge the broad scope of contemporary sociological concerns: Jeffrey Paige's *Agrarian Revolution: Social Movements and Export Agriculture in the Underdeveloped World*, Free Press 1975, and Robert Bellah's *The Broken Covenant: American Civil Religion in Time of Trial*, Seabury Press, New York 1975.

Paige's *Agrarian Revolution* provides a theoretical framework which creatively explores the linkages between forms of economic and social organization and collective political movements. It carefully tests this theoretical model in an impressive empirical analysis of the bases of rural class conflict utilizing both a world-wide comparative investigation and three substantial case studies of contemporary peasant societies. Paige's work not only expands our understanding of political movements in agricultural societies but also holds promise for the exploration of labor and class conflict in urban societies.

Bellah's *The Broken Covenant* is an important contribution by a sociologist to an understanding of American society. In its treatment of civil religion, it both makes concrete and challenges conventional ideas of secularization in western society. It provides an insightful analysis of the culture in which American sociology, as well as American society, is

embedded and, in so doing, re-enforces the recent attention to historical studies within the discipline.

The 1976 Sorokin Award Selection Committee offers its congratulations to Jeffery Paige and Robert Bellah."

Joseph S. Himes as Chair of the DuBois-Johnson-Frazier Award Committee presented the 1976 DuBois-Johnson-Frazier Award to Hylan Garnet Lewis by presenting the following citation:

"To Hylan Garnet Lewis, creative scholar, inspiring teacher, wise counselor, and great human being, the American Sociological Association awards the DuBois-Johnson-Frazier prize for outstanding contributions to sociology in the tradition of these three distinguished scholars."

The Stouffer Award Committee had been scheduled to meet just prior to the Annual Meeting to complete its deliberations. Paul Lazarsfeld, Chair of the Stouffer Award Selection Committee who died August 30, was hospitalized and the meeting was postponed. The delay of the selection of a recipient of the 1976 Stouffer Award was announced during the Plenary Session.

Amos Hawley is New ASA President-Elect

Amos H. Hawley is the choice of ASA members to serve as President-Elect, 1976-77, and to become ASA President at the end of the 1977 Annual Meeting. By having been elected to this office Hawley will serve as chair of the Program Committee for the 1978 Annual Meeting which will be in San Francisco, August 28 through September 1.

Hawley's election originated with a write-in campaign started after ASA candidates had been announced and the time for open nominations had elapsed. In the regularly scheduled election, of 3,386 votes, Helen M. Hughes received 39%, Raymond W. Mack 35%, and write-in votes for Amos H. Hawley amounted to 24% of the votes cast. Fifty-eight votes involved other write-in candidates. According to the ASA Constitution and By-Laws, a second election is required whenever ASA write-in candidates receive more than 10% of the votes. In the subsequent election, 4,405 votes were cast with 28.8% voting for Hughes, 21.8% for Mack, and 49.9% voting for Hawley. Since none of the three candidates received more than



50% of the votes, a run-off election was conducted resulting in Hawley receiving 52.6% of the votes cast.

Amos H. Hawley is Kenan Professor of Sociology at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill where he has been a member of the faculty since 1966. Prior to that time he taught at the University of Michigan. During the ASA Annual Meeting, a reception was held to honor his retirement. The establishment of a special fund to support a series of Amos H. Hawley lectures was announced. These lectures will be alternately held at the University of North Carolina and at the University of Michigan.

Search Authorized for New ASA Executive Officer

The position of ASA Executive Officer involves a two-year contract renewable for a third year. This has been the practice for the last twelve years since the ASA Executive Office was moved to Washington, D.C. Meeting with the Committee on the Executive Office and Budget during the ASA Annual Meeting, Hans O. Mauksch, the current ASA Executive Officer conveyed that his preference was to terminate his tenure after the completion of the initial two-year contract. One of the main reasons for making this decision was, according to Mauksch, his responsibility for the projects on Undergraduate Teaching in Sociology. They will require considerable amount of personal time after September 1977 when the initial grant terminates and when the final reports have to be prepared. Personal considerations related to the personnel and retirement policies of the University of Missouri also were mentioned by Mauksch as reasons for choosing to return to his academic institution after two years' leave of absence. He said: "There are many factors which attract me to continue as Executive Officer to continue with plans just initiated and there are many reasons why I feel I need to

return to my other obligations; but on balance, I had to make my decision in terms of those factors in which my personal commitments could not be substituted."

In searching for a new ASA Executive Officer, the Committee on the Executive Office and Budget welcomes personal applications and nominations by others. In each instance the communication to the Committee should include a statement on experiences in administrative positions and the ability to look at the discipline in a broadly supportive way. The ASA Executive Officer supports and assists the ASA governance system including Council and constitutional and standing committees. The Executive Officer is involved in continuous relationships with academic and governmental agencies in Washington and is looked upon as the person to whom agencies turn for reference about sociology and sociologists.

Results of Referendum

The proposed amendments to the ASA Constitution and By-Laws were rejected in the vote on the referendum. ASA members were asked to cast three votes. One vote was on a proposed change of the Constitution, one on Article II of the By-Laws, and one on Article V of the By-Laws. The results of this referendum was as follows:

Cornerhouse Fund Provides Dissertation Fellowships

A \$15,000 grant has been awarded by the Cornerhouse Fund to the American Sociological Association's Minority Fellowship Program to support three new doctoral dissertation fellowships for the 1976-77 academic year. Persons receiving these awards are designated as Spivack Fellows in honor of the late Sydney Spivack, who was a research sociologist at Princeton University at the time of his death in 1969. Among other achievements, Spivack was coauthor with Robert Althaus of a posthumous volume *The Unequal Elites: The Differential Impact of College on Black and White Graduates*. The Cornerhouse Fund sponsors a variety of activities in the area of social science and social policy.

The Sydney Spivack Minority Dissertation Fellowships for 1976-77 carry a one-year award of \$5,000 to cover dissertation research and writing expenses. Supplemental support has been provided by the academic institutions. The awards stipulate that the dissertation be completed or be in the final stages by the end of the year of support.

The Spivack designees will become an integral part of the ASA Minority Fellowship Pro-

gram, which has been in operation since 1973. Dr. Paul Williams, newly-appointed MFP Director, will monitor the progress of the three Spivack Fellows as he does with all ASA MFP Fellows, offering the guidance and support constantly available to all Fellows.

The recipients of the 1976-77 Spivack Awards, who were selected by the Committee on the Minority Fellowship Program from the large pool of minority fellowship applicants during the annual selection meeting, are as follows:

Meeting With Representatives of Latin American Sociological Assn.

The first meeting between members of the U.S. and the Latin American Sociological Association was held at Duke University during June 25-27. The Latin American Sociological Association was represented by its president, Edelberto Torres Rivas (CLACSO, Buenos Aires) and three members of its executive council: Jose Luis Reyna (El Colegio de Mexico, Mexico City), Gonzalo Abad (FLACSO, Guayaquil), and Juarez Brandao Lopes (CEBRAP, Sao Paulo). U.S. sociologists attending were members of the ASA Liaison Sub-committee with Latin America: Harley L. Browning, Susan Eckstein, Louis W. Goodman, James W. Petras, Alejandro Portes (coordinator), and John Walton. Also attending were Kurt Back, ASA Council Liaison person for international activities; Edward A. Tiryakian, chairperson of the ASA Committee on World Sociology; and Hans O. Mauksch, ASA Executive Officer.

The agenda for the meeting comprised four topics: (a) the mutual influence of theoretical paradigms in U.S. and Latin American sociology; (b) the practical impact of U.S.-sponsored research in Latin American development; (c) the training of Latin American sociologists in the United States and the use of Latin American research facilities by U.S. students conducting thesis research; (d) plans for future institutional collaboration. Sessions were conducted jointly in English and Spanish. Open expression of opinions and the

small size of the meeting contributed to delineate promptly key similarities and differences between sociology as a discipline in both parts of the Continent.

Speaking in the first session, John Walton noted the growing influence of "dependency" and internal colonialism writings in the U.S., as American sociologists come to increasingly question earlier "modernization" approaches to social change. Jose Luis Reyna observed, however, that while "dependency" stands for a complex problematic—a set of interrelated dependent variables—in Latin America, recent U.S. empirical applications have employed it as an unidimensional independent factor for explanation of national differences.

Edelberto Torres outlined the development of the discipline in Latin America. He stressed how many of the currently prominent Latin American sociologists were initially trained in U.S. theories and general perspectives. Their efforts to adapt what appeared to be of value in U.S. sociology to Latin American context and to generate alternatives to inapplicable concepts constitutes a distinct dimension of contemporary Latin American writings.

In a discussion paper for the third session, Harley Browning noted the difficulty of training students in a historico-structural method of analysis, as currently practiced in Latin America. North American institutions, which possess a clear differential advantage for teaching empirical methodologies, do not appear to

Sociologists Appointed to National Science Foundation Posts

A well-known sociologist has been appointed to a major position on the staff of the National Science Foundation. Herbert L. Costner, current Professor at the University of Washington, Seattle, has accepted the position of Director of the Social Sciences Division, which previously had been held by Howard Hines.

Costner commented on the nature of his position and on his functions in a brief statement for FOOTNOTES.

"My role as Director of the Division of Social Sciences includes the responsibilities for programs in sociology, economics, political science, human geography, law and social science, history and philosophy of science, social indicators and a special projects program. For some of these specialties, the National Science Foundation is the major source of research funding; while for others substantial funds from alternative sources are also available. I am hopeful that we will expand the NSF funding available through each of these programs and especially for those programs that have been forced to decline funding for many excellent proposals in the recent past. However, increased funds or even maintenance of present level funding will require a continuous flow of

strong proposals and a continuous flow of outstanding social science research that will help counteract recent criticisms of the social sciences.

"As a general goal, I would hope that we could help in building the confidence of the general science community in the merit and worth of social science research. The Foundation can contribute to this goal, I believe, not only by the careful selection of proposals but also by spot-lighting accomplishments in social research that are impressive for their scientific validity and social utility. I should emphasize that the Social Science Division of the Foundation is heavily dependent on the larger social science community for the excellence of its programs. The Division is engaged primarily in reviewing and processing proposals received and the staff has very limited time for generating or assisting in the development of proposals. The initiative lies with the researcher who has a good idea and has the skill to turn that good idea into a workable proposal."

The view expressed by Costner reflects his and others' concern that the sociological community is not adequately informed about the various funded programs available from NSF. A recent report by a special committee of the National Research Council concluded that the social sciences generally, and sociology specifically, are under-represented in the distribution of research and other scholarly support awarded by the National Science Foundation. The statement by Herbert Costner quoted above echoes one of the conclusions of the committee headed by Herbert Simon by emphasizing that any chance of increasing support for sociology is linked directly to the numbers and quality of proposals from sociologists received by the National Science Foundation.

H. LAURENCE ROSS NEW DIRECTOR OF LAW AND SOCIAL SCIENCES

H. Laurence Ross has been appointed Director of the Program in Law and Social Sciences at the National Science Foundation, replacing David Baldus who has returned to the University of Iowa School of Law. On leave from the University of Denver where he serves as Professor of Sociology and Law, Ross brings to the NSF program a varied background of research on the legal process, on the impact of legal sanctions, and on crime and deviant behavior. He has served as Chairman of the Social Problems Theory Division of the Society for the Study of Social Problems, as a member of the SSSP Board, and as Trustee and Treasurer of the Law and Society Association. Dr. Ross was a Fulbright Lecturer at the University of Louvain (Belgium) in 1969-70 and has recently returned from Oxford University where he was a Distinguished Visiting Scholar at the Center for Socio-Legal Studies.

The National Science Foundation Program in Law and Social Sciences was established in 1972 to foster basic social science research on law and legal systems. Under the direction of Dr. Ross, the program will continue to emphasize studies pertaining to social influences on the legal process and the impact of law on the institutions it is designed to influence.

WILLIAM A. ANDERSON APPOINTED PROGRAM MANAGER IN RANN

William A. Anderson has joined the National Science Foundation's program of Research Applied to National Needs (RANN). Anderson has been appointed Program Manager in Socio-Economic Responses to Natural Hazards within the Division of Advanced Environmental Research and Technology. The goal of this division is to create and sustain a research program geared to enhance the nation's capability to mitigate environmental hazards. Specifically, Dr. Anderson's responsibility is to help focus social science research on societal problems related to natural disasters. This program funds research which has relevance for promoting optimum community response to and recovery from natural hazards such as floods, earthquakes and hurricanes.

William A. Anderson has his doctorate from Ohio State University where he served as field director of the Ohio State University Disaster Research Center. Most recently he has been at Arizona State University in Tempe where he has the rank of Professor. While at Arizona State University, he took a leave of absence to serve as Director of the ASA Minority Fellowship Program.

Teacher Development Workshop Held

Thirty-five faculty members and graduate students attended a workshop for teachers on the Boston College campus July 20-23. Participants came from Notre Dame, Kent State, Princeton, Ohio State, Akron, Rutgers, Cleveland State, Pennsylvania State, Virginia Commonwealth, Maryland, SUNY, C.W. Post, Bowling Green, Syracuse, Case Western Reserve, St. Johns and Boston College. Workshop coordinator, Professor Michael Malec, Chair at Boston College, emphasized that the primary goal of the workshop was "to help participants think about what might be done in their departments to prepare graduate students for their work as teaching assistants and as eventual teachers of sociology."

Sociology programs developed at the University of North Carolina, Michigan State, the University of Connecticut and Boston University were utilized and participants explored numerous teaching resources such as printed materials, videotaping, audio and videotape libraries, and fellow sociologists.

Many participants indicated that they found the workshop of considerable use. Professor Jackson Toby, Rutgers, said "It is possible to help graduate students become more effective teachers with systematic feedback and other approaches I've observed at the workshop. I think, too, that teacher development should not be restricted to graduate students; it would be nice to have teacher development built into the academic system so that we never stop improving."

The workshop and related activities of the Teacher Development Group are made possible by grants from the Lilly Endowment, Inc. (Indianapolis, IN) and The Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education (HEW). The Teacher Development Group is part of the ASA Projects on Teaching Undergraduate Sociology. Hans O. Mauksch, ASA Executive Officer, is Project Director, Sue Titus Reid, ASA Executive Associate, is Associate Project Director, and Charles Goldsmid, Oberlin College, is Director of the Teacher Development Project.

The Boston workshop was the third workshop on the teaching of sociology sponsored by the ASA Project's Teacher Development Group. The first two workshops were aimed at teacher development of current faculty. New Programs

• **Postdoctoral Training in Mental Health Evaluation Research.** UCLA has recently established a new program under the auspices of NIMH which seeks candidates of outstanding ability and potential. A two-year core curriculum is designed in which the first year emphasizes advanced quantitative training and the second is devoted to both substantive and practical evaluation training experiences. The program integrates six major types of professional training: intensive methodological training of a broad fundamental kind, evaluation methods training, supervised on-the-job research experience, training in sociological theories of mental health, training in organization theory as applied to mental health settings, and teaching experience in the mental health and illness field. An important feature of the second year program is a specialized workshop that requires the trainee to serve an internship in a community mental health facility. The trainee can anticipate an appointment as Adjunct Assistant Professor of Sociology in his or her second year. The overall focus is on thoroughly preparing trainees for both academic and non-academic employment. The Program Steering Committee in addition to the Director consists of Howard Freeman, Ralph Turner, Phillip Bonacich, and Melvin Pollner.

Stipends range from \$10-14,000 depending on postdoctoral experience and are subject to standard "payback" provisions of all NRS awards. Minorities and women are encouraged to apply. • **The Social Science Research Council** has announced the continuation of its program of *Postdoctoral Research Training Fellowships* for 1976-77. The purpose of the project is to develop internships as a method of training applied anthropologists to work in mental health and related fields. The NIMH grant provides stipends for students during the periods of internship (usually with a local human service agency or institution) and thesis preparation in the urban and medical tracks of the Anthropology Department's MA program focusing on the applications of

anthropology. The project director is Alvin W. Wolfe, Coordinator of Internships for the department.

The University of Michigan offers an interdepartmental Doctoral Program in Social Work and Social Science. The following PhD degrees are offered: Social Work and Economics, Social Work and Political Science, Social Work and Psychology and Social Work and Sociology. The Doctoral Program in Social Work and Social Science is intended to develop persons with special competence in one of the social sciences and in one area of social welfare. Such training is seen as valuable preparation for leadership in selected positions involving teaching, research, policy and administration in the social welfare field. This rule is strictly adhered to, and therefore meetings devoted to contemporary social problems and to the establishment of legislation or policy are ineligible. Financial assistance is limited to air fare only. All applications must be submitted to the Executive Office of ASA for subsequent transfer to ACLS.
